### Pickleball draws avid players to Northville Community Center

What's the game with a funny name that has become fanatically popular in recent years? It's pickleball, a moderately strenuous game played indoors or outdoors on a badminton-sized court with a short tennis net. It's a combination of tennis, badminton and ping-pong. Players use a large paddle to hit a plastic ball with holes. Points are scored while serving. The game is played as doubles or singles.

At the Northville Community Center, pickleball has caught on like wildfire. Men and women age 50 and up gather at the Community Center Wednesday through Sunday afternoons and evenings to play a sport that's part athletic and part social.

Nancy Kossak, of Northville, says she likes the competitiveness of the game. "It's a challenge and good exercise. You can play year-round and the gym is air

conditioned in the summer."

Bill George, of Canton, says he plays the game because it improves his mobility. "As you get older, you don't have to run around the court as much because they are half the size of a tennis court." He adds, "And, I like the people."

"I'm obsessed with the game," says Maryann Collins, of New Hudson.

Tami Fontaine, of Westland, noted, "You can come alone and play with others. You never have to worry about not having a team mate."

"It's the best thing," said Moe, of Canton. "It's not as boring as walking,"

Michael Namm, of Novi, runs a pickleball clinic at Hillside School gym every Wednesday from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. The drop-in clinic costs a couple bucks to learn how to play. He notes there are rules and strategies that players should know before playing a game at the Community Center.

Attire is typically shorts and a short sleeve shirt because players move quickly and work up a sweat.

"Once they are hooked, they never give up the game," Namm said.

According to the USAPA, pickleball was invented in 1965 on Bainbridge Island, Washington. Three dads - Joel Pritchard, Bill Bell and Barney McCallum - created the game for their kids, who were bored with their usual summertime

activities. The game has evolved from original handmade equipment and simple rules into a popular sport throughout the U.S. and Canada.

The tour begins with a wagon ride to the Sugar Bush, where you will learn about the maple tree in its natural setting. Find out how to tap the maple tree and collect the sap. You may even get to taste the sap straight from the tree. Ride the wagon back to the Sugar Shack to see how the sap is converted into delicious maple syrup, and learn how syrup is graded.

After the tour, warm up in the Maybury Farm Welcome Center where hot drinks and snacks are available to enjoy next to the toasty wood stove. Pure Michigan maple syrup will be sold along with free recipes to try at home.

March 22 The History of Michigan's Largest Commercial Fishery Mill Race Village - Old School Church 7 p.m.

This Lecture documents the history of Michigan's largest commercial fishery on

Saginaw Bay from the 1850s to current times. Early records indicate Lower Saginaw, now known as Bay City, had the first fisheries. The fishing industry also developed at Bay Port, Essexville, East Tawas, Au Sable, Caseville, Oscoda, and Sebewaing. This 150-year visual history includes archival photos and rare film footage from fisheries around Saginaw Bay. Two years of research and first-hand interviews prove that Saginaw Bay was the world's largest freshwater fishery and is still a viable fishery today. Free and open to the public. ### Skywarn Severe Weather Spotter Training

Skywarn is an effort to save lives during severe weather emergencies by expanding networks of spotters and getting more people involved in tornado warning programs. Not all tornadoes show up on radar, but they can be seen. Only one instrument can detect a tornado or funnel with complete certainty: the human eye.

Skywarn training sessions train individuals how to accurately observe weather phenomena such as floods, hail, wind and its associated damage, cloud features that lead to tornadoes and those that do

not. The class covers what information to report and how to report it. Basic severe weather safety is also covered. Classes are FREE and last 1.5 hours. While new technological and scientific tools have advanced the National Weather Service (NWS) capability to predict severe weather, the trained spotter remains essential to the NWS warning process. The more trained "eyes" the NWS has in the field, the better they can serve the public during a severe weather event.

All interested parties (e.g. fire, police, EMS, security, volunteers and citizens) are encouraged to attend this program, coordinated by The Oakland County Homeland Security Division.

## Sign up for automatic tax bill payment

Take advantage of automatic tax bill payment. Residents and businesses may now pay their tax bills automatically by <u>clicking here and completing the online</u> form.

Enroll in the program and your summer tax bill will be paid on August 31. For the winter tax bill you designate the date of payment as either December 31 or February 14. By taking advantage of this program, your taxes will always be paid on time whether you are sick or out of town. Added benefits are no checks to write, no need to wonder if the check was received in time to avoid penalty and no trips to City Hall.

Participants in automatic bill payment of property taxes receive their tax bill in the mail on July 1 and December 1 with a letter confirming when the withdrawal will be made from their account. Please note: This is a year-round program. Electronic Funds Payment is not available for only the summer tax or only the winter tax bill.

## **Accountability & Transparency**

To meet the requirements for Accountability & Transparency under City, Village, and Township Revenue Sharing/County Incentive Program (CVTRS/CIP), the City of Northville must certify to the Michigan Department of Treasury they have produced and made readily available to the public:

- A Citizen's Guide of its most recent local finances, including recognition of its unfunded liabilities
- 2. A Performance Dashboard
- 3. A Debt Service Report containing a detailed listing of its debt service requirements, including, at a minimum, the issuance date, issuance amount, type of debt instrument, a listing of all revenues pledged to finance debt service by debt instrument, and a listing of the annual payment amounts until maturity
- 4. A Projected Budget Report of revenues and expenditures including, at a minimum, the current fiscal year and a projection for the immediately following year and an explanation of the assumptions used for the projections
