This Just In...

Northville Community Foundation brings good things to life

The Northville Community Foundation is the catalyst that makes educational and substantive programs happen, from nurturing baby animals at Maybury Farm to organizing the Independence Day Parade that draws 20,000 people to downtown Northville on the 4th of July.

The foundation makes a positive impact in the community in large and small ways. It strives to expand education in a variety of settings, from scholarships and camps to the fields and barn at Maybury Farm.

The farm has been operated by the foundation for 14 years on a land lease from the State of Michigan. During the transfer of management, a huge fire destroyed the barns and many farm animals. In a groundswell of support, the community came together to replace the barns that had burnt to the ground and brought in new animals. To preserve the history of the site, the foundation and its supporters sought older barns and discovered them in Novi's Island Lake subdivision, which was being built on former farmland. 

This iconic photo shows a barn overhanging the edges of a huge flat-bed trailer. The hulking structure on wheels took up the entire width of the road from Novi to the farm for the four-mile move in 2005.

Over the years, Maybury Farm has evolved into a hands-on, learning experience. It draws 20,000 visitors annually. Jessica Striegle, executive director of the Northville Community Foundation, said the farm is an ideal setting to educate the community about the connection between food and fiber systems, and between agriculture and animals.

"Anything you would find on a working farm, you will find at Maybury Farm," Striegle said. "We have around 60 animals now. A new flock of chickens will be laying eggs. Silver Springs Elementary (school) raised over \$300 during a fundraiser on St. Patrick's Day. With that money, we were able to redesign the inside of chicken coop and buy chickens."

The farm is run by Cindy Kern, with help from Jordan Umfleet, an Eastern Michigan University intern, and seasonal employees and volunteers.

"The kids really enjoy it," said Striegle. "There's a section of the garden that scouting troops tend to, as part of the program 'How does the garden grow?' There's also a farm camp - June through August, where campers can feed the animals and go on nature hikes."

The Northville Community Foundation celebrates 20 years in July 2017. It will promote the milestone anniversary during the Independence Day parade that it has hosted for 19 of those 20 years. Other plans are in the works.

One of the foundation's anniversary presents will be a strategic plan for the farm being developed by the board. "We want to make improvements to the farm. We are working on ways to grow and improve," Striegle said.

"The foundation's mission is to enhance and enrich life in the community," she added. "We (the board and staff) are always asking, 'How can we make the farm part of that?'"

Striegle says the farm is taking note of trends, such as people growing their own gardens and urban farming. To sync with the trend, the farm began a "U pick" garden in 2016 that features heirloom plants. This year, it will double in size. It will continue its popular program of selecting a "just laid" egg - with more coming from the new hens.

As the board mulls future needs, kids and adults come in droves to programs that range from reading hours and farm tours, to the fall maze and other seasonal events. Visitors relish getting a taste of the farming life - an experience that is bound to get even better with a new strategic plan.

The parade and farm are among its most visible services. At the parade, you will see bands, historic vehicles, clowns and other dazzling delights. In special segments of the parade, you may see neighborhood kids ride their bikes or watch your friends walk their dogs. The foundation is accepting entries for floats, marchers and other entertaining elements through June 16.

The Northville Community Foundation's Independence Day Parade is a highlight of the year for participants and spectators alike.

As a grant-making organization, the foundation contributes funds in diverse categories - from the arts and historic projects to youth and seniors. Plus, they give scholarships to deserving college-bound students. Their website has a wealth of information on grants and how it connects programs to the community. Grant applications are being accepted now through July 31, with grants awarded in November.

"We aren't focused on just one cause," said Striegle. "We help a variety of needs in the community - in the present and also for the long term."



Be a pART of it! The Northville Art House is proud to present Confluence: Mixed Media Fiber Art by Jennifer Gould & Boisali Biswas. Confluence merges the talented world of two

Michigan artists who weave their own observations, themes and conceptions into extraordinary fiber art using both traditional and contemporary materials and techniques.

Jennifer Gould studies, experiments and is fascinated with textiles in all their varied forms. Influenced by nature, abstract and non-objective shapes, and wild colors, her pieces involve a wide diversity of techniques combined with unusual fabrics. Gould creates unique wall-hung and freestanding textiles as well as textile figures to express her place in the world.

Boisali Biswas comes from India, a country with a rich heritage of art and culture. She has a deep-rooted attachment to the traditional art forms of her native country and owes a part of her stylization to India's captivating traditional patterns and the rich array of colors. Biswas combines Western styles and techniques with ethnic arts from around the world to create a multicultural 'canvas' of fiber assemblages, art quilts, and wallpaper weavings.

Both artists have presented in galleries and received awards in exhibitions statewide and around the country.

Confluence opens with a reception on Friday, June 2, from 6 - 9 p.m. with a gallery

talk at 7 p.m. The reception is sponsored by Holly Drouin of Luxury Home Sales and Rachel Wasserman of Caliber Home Loans. The exhibition runs through June 30 during Art House hours, Tuesday-Friday, 12 - 5 p.m. and Saturday, 12 - 4 p.m.



After lunch, in the adjacent theater, there will be a presentation by Lloyd Bruce Turnbull, Northville historian and raconteur. Bruce was born on Oct. 7, 1919, above his father's Northville Electric Shop, where his father did most of the original wiring and electrical for many homes between Northville and Howell. Bruce graduated from Northville High in 1937, married his high school sweetheart, and became a leader in the community. There are published books of his walking tours and stories of the early years. At age 97, he still lives in his home in downtown Northville.

Online payments for utility bills and taxes

Online payments for taxes and utilities is available on the City's website offered through Point & Pay, for a convenience fee. To access this option, please <u>click</u> <u>here</u>. On the left side of your screen, select either Property Tax and Assessing Lookup or Utility Bill Lookup. Search for your property and click on the "Pay Online" button. You will then be re-directed to the Point & Pay website to make a payment.

<u>Fees</u>: Please note there is a convenience fee paid directly to Point & Pay if you choose to utilize this option:

Credit Cards: 3% Fee (minimum \$2)

E-Checks: Flat Fee of \$3, up to \$10,000 or Flat Fee of \$10, anything over \$10,000

Streetlights

Streetlight out? Businesses and residents can report streetlight outages <u>online</u>. This link goes directly to the DTE streetlight outage reporting tool.

Businesses and residents who have a DTE wooden power pole on or adjacent to their property are eligible to have outdoor protective lighting installed on the pole to illuminate their private property. Residents may even qualify for no up-front cost installation. Please call 866-503-0627 and leave a detailed message that includes name, address, city, zip code and phone number with area code for a DTE representative to contact you within three business days.

Brush collection program

The City of Northville allows residents to place branches at the curb without bundling or bagging them. Branches six feet long and up to six inches in diameter can be placed at the curb for removal by the City's solid waste collection contractor.

Residents can dispose of large piles of branches by placing them at the curb. Every Tuesday, year-round, a crew will come through each neighborhood and chip any branches left at the curb.

Branches must be in the street right-of-way (Between the street and the sidewalk).

Simply stack the branches neatly behind the curb with the cut ends facing the street.

We do not accept roots, stumps, dirt, lumber, railroad ties or any wood with metal in it. Residents can dispose of firewood pieces and stumps with their normal weekly garbage (Maximum 35 gallon cans and 60 lb. weight limit).

Residents may have to rake up small branches after the large brush piles are collected by the crew.

Sewage backups

If you experience an overflow or backup of a sewage disposal system or storm water system and want to file a claim with the City, <u>please check our website for details</u> or call the Department of Public Works at 248-449-9930.

When presenting a written claim, you will be required to provide the following items:

- 1. Copies of receipts for cleaning costs, plumbing bills, or other bills.
- List of the damaged items and receipts to prove the ages of your items.
 Reimbursement for the Actual Cash Value of damaged items is the maximum amount payable.
- 3. Please make an attempt to provide pictures of anything you wish to claim that was damaged due to the sewer backup.

The filing of a claim does not guarantee reimbursement.

Most homeowner's insurance will not cover sewage backups, but insurance can often be obtained as an added item. Ask your insurance provider about this option. Also, consider having a plumber install a check valve - backflow preventer - to help minimize the risk of backups and related damage.
