This Just In...

City Council recap of Aug. 7 meeting

City to continue banking services with Comerica Bank - The City's Banking services were rebid with proposals submitted by Comerica, Flagstar, Huntington and Level One. City Council approved the finance director's recommendation to continue its existing relationship with Comerica Bank for five years at an estimated annual cost of \$21,710. Rebidding this service is expected to save approximately \$26,000 annually.

Investing with Oakland County Local Government Investment Pool - City Council approved a recommendation by the finance director/treasurer to invest \$750,000 in the Oakland County Local Government Investment Pool, primarily to diversity the investment portfolio. The City's investment policy's main objectives are safety, liquidity and return. The initial funds being invested are coming from cash reserves and will be charged a fee of .037%.

New pagers approved for Fire Department - City Council approved the fire chief's recommendation to purchase 60 new megahertz pagers. This is an upgrade from the current hybrid system that uses VHF pagers with 800 MHz digital radios, since newer pager technology wasn't available when the radios were purchased in 2009. The VHF pagers are no longer supported by the manufacturer and have caused problems by not being able to transmit all of the calls to the on-call responders, among other issues. The cost for the 60 Unication G4 P25 voice pagers will be \$37,890 including 60 charging bases and a three-year warranty at no cost due to a timely incentive.

There were no public comments.

The City of Northville is inviting historic architects to submit an RFP to conduct an intensive-level survey of the City's Historic District

A historic architect is being sought to conduct an intensive-level survey to uncover new information about the historical features and architectural attributes of up to 343 houses and other buildings in the City's Historic District. It's the first study of its kind in 45 years, when a partial survey of 61 historic structures in the 144-acre district was conducted.

Funding for the survey is being arranged through a grant from the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). The federal government and the City of Northville will share in the cost of the survey. The City as well as local, state and federal agencies dedicated to historic preservation will receive an extensive report with color photos detailing survey findings. The public and owners of historic properties will have access to the full report as well as survey data and summary reports in digital format on the City's website.

"The survey will be a good resource for the Historic District Commission and the

property owner," said Sally Elmiger, principal of Carlisle Wortman Associates and a project manager of the historic district survey.

Since the HDC must approve petitions for changes to historic structures brought by the property owners, having a new comprehensive survey will provide additional historic information to help the commission better understand the building components - what must be maintained and why it is historically significant.

"For the Historic District Commission to do its job, it needs more information," Elmiger said. "The survey will provide that missing link." In addition, she noted, "The survey findings will help the owners understand what elements are important to the structure, and preserve them for the future."

To determine the significance of the architectural and historical data, applications to the HDC ask for the date of construction, architectural style, historic photos, the name of the original owner, builder developer, and the building timeline (e.g. dates and locations of additions, demolition and changes). In addition, owners must provide a detailed description of building materials that are original to the resource, and any relevant historic information, such as notable residents, recognized landmark, important site and other attributes. Several of these topics will be investigated during the intensive-level survey.


Every Thursday through October Farmers' Market 8 a.m. - 3 p.m.

Household paints, stains, dyes; floor wax, carpet cleaner; furniture polish, bathroom cleaners, stain removers, solvents; pharmaceutical waste (non-controlled substances only); nail polish, glue; fertilizer, lawn and garden chemicals, pesticides; antifreeze, motor oil, gasoline; automotive batteries and dry cell batteries, fluorescent bulbs (all types); fire extinguishers and smoke detectors; mercury

thermometers, thermostats and elemental mercury.

Electronics Recycling - computer CPUs, monitors (no CRT monitors or CRT TVs accepted), printers, scanners, keyboards, mice; cell phones, fax machines, copiers and televisions.

Items Not Accepted


Commercial waste, industrial waste, radioactive material, explosives, ammunition, 55-gallon drums, shock sensitive materials, household trash, refrigerators, microwaves or other appliances, tires, yard waste and concrete. Did you know it is illegal to park on City Streets between 3 a.m. and 5 a.m. without a permit? If you are having visitors or work done on your driveway and must park in the street overnight, call Community Dispatch at 248-349-1234 by 2:00 a.m. with the license plate number and street location of the vehicle to avoid a parking ticket.

Tree permits required

A permit from the Building Department may be required prior to cutting down any tree in the City of Northville. Before cutting down a tree, you must first make application to the Building Department to determine if a permit is required. The City enforces this ordinance if trees are cut down without the required permit. To avoid enforcement action, please contact the City of Northville Building Department at 248 449-9902. Tree cutting is regulated by Section 90 of the City of Northville Code.

An easy way to dispose of old medications



Do you have outdated prescription or over-the-counter medications that you want to get rid of? Don't flush these medications down the toilet - it pollutes the water supply; don't throw them away because they will end up in a landfill and may be consumed by wildlife. There is a safe and convenient way to dispose of unwanted medications. Bring your unwanted medication -

no liquids, needles or injectable medication - to the secure drop box in the lobby at the Northville Township Police Department at 41600 Six Mile Road. There is no paperwork required and the bin can be accessed 24/7. When the drop box is full, collections are picked up for disposal by the Drug Enforcement Authority.

Sewage backups

If you experience an overflow or backup of a sewage disposal system or storm water system and want to file a claim with the City, <u>please check our website for details</u> or call the Department of Public Works at 248-449-9930.

When presenting a written claim, you will be required to provide the following items:

- 1. Copies of receipts for cleaning costs, plumbing bills, or other bills.
- List of the damaged items and receipts to prove the ages of your items.
 Reimbursement for the Actual Cash Value of damaged items is the maximum amount payable.
- 3. Please make an attempt to provide pictures of anything you wish to claim that was damaged due to the sewer backup.

The filing of a claim does not guarantee reimbursement.

Most homeowner's insurance will not cover sewage backups, but insurance can often be obtained as an added item. Ask your insurance provider about this option. Also, consider having a plumber install a check valve - backflow preventer - to help minimize the risk of backups and related damage.
