#### This Just In...

#### Firefighter of the Year J.C. Sicard is honored, cites teamwork

Jean-Christophe (J.C.) Sicard, a two-year veteran of the Northville City Fire Department (NCFD), received the Firefighter of the Year award for 2017. It was announced by Fire Chief Steve Ott at the NCFD annual holiday party on Dec. 2.

"He has a knack for being where the action is," Ott said.

In 2017, J.C. (and two others) received a commendation from the City of Northville Police Dept. for assisting officers with an intoxicated individual who threatened to kill himself and others - resolving the incident in a safe manner. J.C. (and four others) received a unit citation from the Novi Fire Dept. for mutual aid response on a fatal structure fire. In addition, J.C. is dedicated to training and responds quickly to dispatch calls, Ott noted.

A native of France, J.C. puts a lot into his role as a firefighter and first responder. Since it's an on-call position, those who serve also have other jobs. He is a self-employed custom painter and also works in a home remodeling business owned by fellow firefighter Lt. Matt Samhat.

"I was surprised by the award. I really appreciate it," J.C. said. "It's more than an individual award. It takes teamwork. By working together, things get done faster, better and safer."

J.C. received a plaque for Firefighter of the Year and his name now appears on a master plaque in Fire Station #1. He typically responds to up to two calls a day on his pager. If available, he confirms with dispatch, jumps in his vehicle, turns on the flashing light and siren and drives to the Fire Station, where he and other responders transfer to a fire truck and head to the scene of the fire or emergency response call.

He's also part of the training committee and often goes to the station on Thursday nights to conduct training. He is motivated by the ability to help those in distress.

"The CPR calls are the most challenging," J.C. said. "Sometimes we are lucky. Sometimes it's too late. When that happens, it's a sad day for us and the families.

A recent call to Northville Square resulted in a good outcome for an individual who experienced a severe medical condition while exercising. J.C. was one of the first

responders on the scene, and an AED was used in the resuscitation.

"The dedication and hard work of J.C. and many others in the department allow us to provide a high level of service on a consistent basis," Ott said. "My personal thanks go out to our firefighters and first responders who train, work hard and respond to calls every day."

# Residents and businesses who park on city streets between 3-5 a.m. need to obtain a parking permit before year-end

Parking is prohibited on city streets and municipal lots between 3 a.m. and 5 a.m. If you need to park your vehicle on the street or in a lot overnight for an extended period of time, please complete this application and submit it to the Police Department to obtain a permit. If you have any outstanding parking tickets, you must pay those tickets before a permit will be issued.

Parking permits for neighborhood streets cost \$10 per month or \$120 per year; permits for the Central Business District are \$5 per month or \$60 per year. The deadline for obtaining an annual permit is Dec. 31, 2017. The permit comes with a parking sticker to be placed on the vehicle's upper left corner of the rear window.

Permits typically are used by people who come to work between 3 a.m. and 5 a.m. in the Central Business District, and residents who have several cars and not enough driveway space to park them.

"The permit is part of an ordinance that ensures residents are not interrupted from any City services they would expect, such as snow removal, leaf removal and street sweeping. It also helps the Police Dept. identify suspicious vehicles and keeps the streets clear for emergency response," said Police Officer Scott Groff, who issues the permits.

For example, if a home has a two-car driveway and three vehicles, the homeowner would need to purchase a permit if they plan to park one vehicle in the street.

If residents have a short-term parking concern, such as having a visitor, they can call Dispatch at 248-349-1234 and be added to the overnight parking list to avoid being issued a citation. However, this permission will not be granted on a continuous basis.

The Police Dept. issues 60 to 70 parking permits annually. If you park without a permit, you will be ticketed. Fines are \$5 if paid within seven days, \$15 after seven days, and \$40 after 21 days.



Through Jan. 3, 2018
Friends of the Rouge joins Newman's
Own Foundation \$500K holiday
challenge on CrowdRise

Help Friends of the Rouge (FOTR) win \$150,000 by donating to its CrowdRise campaign. The Newman's Own Foundation

#### Save the Bug Hunts

The Winter Stonefly Search and the Spring and Fall Bug Hunts are in danger of being cancelled. Alliance of Rouge Communities (ARC) does not plan to fund the Benthic

Macroinvertebrate Monitoring Program for 2018 due to other obligations.

FOTR notes that this program has been around for 19 years, and involves hundreds of volunteers who look for inspects and other artifacts which is documented. The collecting data is used to screen for problems and guide restoration efforts. In fall 2017, volunteers discovered invasive Asian clams in the Main Branch for the first time and were able to document the effect of the recent extreme low water levels in the Lower Branch (see report). No one else is tracking the overall health of the river in this way.

FOTR is seeking to find replacement funding for the loss of \$30,000. At minimum, they are trying to raise \$20,000 by the end of March 2018 to continue at a barebones level.

#### Sign up for automatic tax bill payment

Take advantage of automatic tax bill payment. Residents and businesses may now pay their tax bills automatically by <u>clicking here and completing the online form</u>.

Enroll in the program and your summer tax bill will be paid on Aug. 31. For the winter tax bill you designate the date of payment as either Dec. 31 or Feb. 14. By taking advantage of this program, your taxes will always be paid on time.

Participants in automatic bill payment of property taxes receive their tax bill in the mail on July 1 and Dec. 1 with a letter confirming when the withdrawal will be made from their account. PLEASE NOTE: This is a year-round program. Electronic Funds Payment is not available for only the summer tax or only the winter tax bill.

You may retrieve tax and assessing data from the convenience of your home 24/7 by visiting the City of Northville's website.

#### **Accountability & Transparency**

To meet the requirements for Accountability & Transparency under City, Village, and Township Revenue Sharing/County Incentive Program (CVTRS/CIP), the City of Northville must certify to the Michigan Department of Treasury annually that they have produced and made readily available to the public:

- A Citizen's Guide of its most recent local finances, including recognition of its unfunded liabilities
- 2. A Performance Dashboard
- 3. A Debt Service Report containing a detailed listing of its debt service requirements, including, at a minimum, the issuance date, issuance amount, type of debt instrument, a listing of all revenues pledged to finance debt service by debt instrument, and a listing of the annual payment amounts until maturity
- 4. A Projected Budget Report of revenues and expenditures including, at a minimum, the current fiscal year and a projection for the immediately following year and an explanation of the assumptions used for the projections

#### Yard signs

Please be advised that signs cannot be placed in the right-of-way. Signs must be placed on your property, behind the sidewalk, or will be subject to removal. If you have any questions, please call Bill Barent, Ordinance Officer at 248-305-2707.

#### Sewage backups

If you experience an overflow or backup of a sewage disposal system or storm water system and want to file a claim with the City, <u>please check our website for details</u> or call the Department of Public Works at 248-449-9930.

When presenting a written claim, you will be required to provide the following items:

- 1. Copies of receipts for cleaning costs, plumbing bills, or other bills.
- 2. List of the damaged items and receipts to prove the ages of your items. Reimbursement for the Actual Cash Value of damaged items is the maximum amount payable.
- 3. Please make an attempt to provide pictures of anything you wish to claim that was damaged due to the sewer backup.

The filing of a claim does not guarantee reimbursement.

Most homeowner's insurance will not cover sewage backups, but insurance can often be obtained as an added item. Ask your insurance provider about this option. Also, consider having a plumber install a check valve - backflow preventer - to help minimize the risk of backups and related damage.
