#### This Just In...

City Council recap Aug. 20, 2018

**Zoning ordinance amendments were approved** following the second reading (articles 18, 25, 26), which simplifies temporary uses. As such, food trucks will be allowed to operate in any zoning district on private property, as long as the vendor and property owner have registered that intent with the City. New temporary uses that will be overseen by the Building Dept. official but do not require a permit include the temporary installation of dumpsters and port-a-potties.

Permits will now be required for:

- 1. seasonal sales of perishable items by non-profit entities on private property
- 2. temporary outdoor special events held on private property where the general public is invited
- 3. The temporary construction of a building or office
- 4. A temporary emergency residence.

A change to article 21 prohibits the use of electronic changeable copy signs, grandfathering in those that already exist.

Petition to vacate a portion of Horton Street - Several residents of the Oakwood subdivision signed a petition to ask the City of Northville to vacate the southern portion of Horton Street, between Hill and Maplewood, keeping it open for public access and utility work as needed. The request is intended to prevent additional homes from being built in that area, which is wooded and provides access to nearby Maplewood Park. City Council approved the petition and a public hearing will be set.

Allen Terrace roofing project - A change order request of \$8,453.50 for the roof repair and replacement project underway at Allen Terrace was approved by City Council, enabling Garland/DBS, Inc. to refasten plywood that was not fastened to the joists, per code, at the time that the senior apartment residence was built. During the replacement of gutters and roof hatches, it was discovered that the plywood was buckling and separating from the structure. An additional \$28,417.50 was approved for contingencies, which remains within the budgeted amount for the project. (The original bid came in under budget.)

**Appointments** - Stephen Calkins was appointed by City Council to serve as an alternate member of the Board of Zoning Appeals, to fill a vacancy, with a term that expires July 1, 2021. Calkins, a law professor at Wayne State University, is a 30-year resident of the City and previously served on the BZA as an alternate member from 1987 to 1995.

#### Questions and Answers about the 2018 Street Bond

When Northville voters cast their ballot in the Nov. 6 election, they'll be asked to decide on a 0.98 millage for the issuance of a \$3,050,000 Street Improvement Bond to fund street repairs and upgrades for the next 10 years.

The City has developed a set of questions and answers (Q&As) about the bond issue that appears on the <u>City's website</u>. Here is one of the questions:

#### How will the bond money be allocated?

The bond funds would be combined with the City's existing street millage and

\$1,050,000 from reserve funds to finance an infusion of \$6.25 million into street repairs and replacement over the next four years. After spending the bond funds, the City would continue to use its existing street millage (currently 1.68 mills), which generates about \$550,000 annually, to repair and maintain the improved street system. # Former Northville mayor lands legal position at MML

Long-time municipal attorney and former Northville Mayor Chris Johnson was named general counsel for the Michigan Municipal League.

According to the Northville Record, Johnson will provide legal advice to the league's executive director and board of trustees, and oversee legal programs and staff. He succeeds William Mathewson, who retired this summer.

Johnson served as the mayor of Northville from 1987 to 2015. He was named Citizen of the Year in 2015 by the Northville Chamber of Commerce.

Maybury hits high notes for summer fun

A short drive (or bike ride) from Northville leads you to a 944-acre natural habitat that provides a scenic place to chill, revel in the woods, or rev up your exercise routine by biking or hiking on sun-dappled, tree-lined paths.

Maybury State Park offers visitors plenty to do in the summer and invites everyone to its last concert of the season when The Mayburys play at 7 p.m. on Monday, Aug. 27. Throughout the summer, compact bands (2 to 3 pieces) with distinctive rhythm have amplified the beauty of the park. Spectators partake of a cultural feast - listening to music in a meadow framed by towering trees, carpeted by wild flowers in season and accented by exotic plants and native grasses.

The band doesn't have an official stage; it sets up near the renovated trailhead just south of the Eight Mile Road parking lot. Visitors already in the park often stay for the concert, while others head in specifically for this event. Some nights, there are 40 spectators, other nights there are around 100, said Park Supervisor Traci Sincock.

Maybury provided the location for kids summer camps run by Northville Parks & Recreation, which drew 166 campers; by the Girls Scouts, which had about 200 campers; and by the Boy Scouts, which drew some 85 campers. The weekend of Aug. 18 marked the third year for the popular "Family Campout program", also run by the Parks & Recreation Dept., where 25 families pitched tents and had access to the day camp building for indoor plumbing and shelter from the rain. Aside from this once-a-year event, there is no public camping at the park.

As Maybury continues to provide a beautiful rural park within an urban setting, the

management wants to know what else the public wants from this natural beauty. As part of a Management Plan process, people are invited to <u>complete a survey</u> through Aug. 31 to provide input on access, activities and new additions to the park. Sincock has also received feedback from visitors who attended the "Coffee with the Supervisor" sessions held from spring through summer.

"The coffees have been great for community outreach," Sincock said. "We've received feedback about how we can make Maybury even better."

Friends of Maybury supports the park in many ways - by funding projects, initiating new plans and being a hands-on group. Sincock would like to see more people join this group and notes that there will be a volunteer clean-up this fall. See the <u>Friends</u> website for more details.


#### **Northville Arts Commission seeks commissioners**

## Scheduling online inspections

Contractors and homeowners in the City of Northville may <u>schedule inspections</u> <u>using the new online inspection portal</u>. The portal allows users to request all types of inspections, such as building, electrical, plumbing and heating. Users must have their assigned permit number when using the Inspection portal.

If you are requesting an inspection for the following business day, it must be scheduled by 3:30pm.

# Paperless billing option for utilities

Utility bill customers may now sign up to receive email bills or arrange for automatic payment through the City's website. E-bills are emailed on the billing date with a full page bill attached in pdf format. Automatic payment is an arrangement between the customer's bank and our bank by which the amount due is deducted from the customer's account each due date. You can <u>sign up online</u> or call 248-449-9901 with questions.

Each year the City has between 10 and 20 water main breaks, and most of these happen when the temperatures are below freezing. If residents see water bubbling out of the ground, contact the Public Works Department at (248) 449-9930 or (248) 349-1234 after hours and report its location. The sooner the leak is identified and reported, the quicker it can be repaired, reducing the chances of contamination entering the water system, and minimizing the cost for lost water.

## Free home fire safety review

The Northville City Fire Department, which serves the Cities of Northville and Plymouth, is pleased to offer home fire safety reviews. Simply contact the Department at 248-449-9920 to schedule an appointment. A team of Fire Department personnel will meet with you at your home and review items such as smoke detectors, electrical outlets, storage of flammable materials, home escape plans and other items that can have an impact on home fire safety. This is a free service.

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) reports that in 2014, structure fires caused 2,860 deaths, 13,425 injuries and \$9.8 billion in property damage. Home fire safety reviews can help reduce the risk of fire and its consequences.

#### Sewage backups

If you experience an overflow or backup of a sewage disposal system or storm water system and want to file a claim with the City, <u>please check our website for</u> details or call the Department of Public Works at 248-449-9930.

When presenting a written claim, you will be required to provide the following items:

- 1. Copies of receipts for cleaning costs, plumbing bills, or other bills.
- List of the damaged items and receipts to prove the ages of your items.
   Reimbursement for the Actual Cash Value of damaged items is the maximum amount payable.
- 3. Please make an attempt to provide pictures of anything you wish to claim that was damaged due to the sewer backup.

The filing of a claim does not guarantee reimbursement.

Most homeowner's insurance will not cover sewage backups, but insurance can often be obtained as an added item. Ask your insurance provider about this option. Also, consider having a plumber install a check valve - backflow preventer - to help minimize the risk of backups and related damage.
