This Just In...

Keeping you informed about the 2018 Street Bond on the Nov. ballot



A community forum on the street bond will be held Sept. 20, from 6 to 8 p.m. at the Community Center, 303 W. Main. Read City News, the City website and our social media sites for more information.

The City has developed a set of questions and answers (Q&As) so voters are well informed when they cast their ballot in the Nov. 6 election pertaining to a 0.98 millage for the issuance of a \$3,050,000 Street Improvement Bond to fund street repairs and upgrades for the next 10 years.

Here is one of the questions:

Why do we need a roads millage?

The amount of funds budgeted annually for road repair and replacement, approximately \$550,000 per year, is not sufficient to keep pace with the rate at which roads are deteriorating.

At present, 46.5% of Northville roads have a "poor" rating ... which means that we are repairing roads when they get closer to the "replacement" condition. This is a very expensive way to maintain roads. It also results in people driving on roads that are more likely to develop potholes and crumbling conditions.

To see what your cost would be if the millage passes, find your taxable value for <u>Oakland properties</u>, for <u>Wayne County properties</u>. Multiply your taxable value by .00098 to determine your new annual rate during that 10-year period. That cost will be adjusted lower when new properties are added to the tax rolls.



Can you make it through the corn maze at Maybury Farm?

The Maybury Farm corn maze begins Sept. 14 with nine acres of thick, lush corn that features a new design and theme: Farmers feed families. There are games to play while you are winding your way through, and it typically takes about one hour to complete the maze. It's a fun outing for kids and adults alike. Those who complete the challenge may enter their names to win some fantastic prizes at the end of the season.


This year, Maybury Farm has a new Kiddie Maze that is approximately one acre, takes about 20 minutes to wander through, and includes a children's "Finger Find" game.

For those who want to try something more challenging and scary, the Maybury Farm corn maze is open until 10 p.m. on Fridays (opens at 5 p.m.) and Saturdays (opens at noon) so you may attempt to find your way through the maze in the dark with just the moon and a flashlight to guide your way. The corn maze is open Sunday from noon to 7 p.m.

After finishing the maze, head back to the Maybury Farm General Store to enjoy delicious Parmenter's cider and donuts, along with other tasty treats. You can also visit Maybury Farm's u-pick pumpkin patch.

The last wagon leaves for the maze one hour prior to close. The corn maze runs through Oct. 28. Admission is \$9 per person for the maze, and includes farm admission and a tractor-drawn wagon ride to and from the maze. Children ages 2 and under attend for free.

Maybury Farm is operated by the Northville Community Foundation; funds raised from the corn maze are used to help support the work of the Farm, and its mission of connecting the community to animals and agriculture.



Saturday, Sept. 22 Household Hazardous Waste Collection City Yards - 650 Doheny 8 a.m. - 2 p.m.

(Seven Mile West to Northville Road. Turn right on Northville Road to Doheny Dr.)

This event is open to residents of the Northville Township, City of Northville, and Livonia residents only.

This event is for the disposal of residential hazardous waste only. The wastes that will be accepted at this event are listed below:

- Aerosol cans, any household chemicals
- Antifreeze/Transmission Fluid Batteries: Automobile/Household/Marine
- Caustic/Acids
- Computer Equipment/Modem/Printers
- Compact Spiral/Fluorescent Light Bulbs
- Electronics; keyboards, mouse, cell phones
- Expired Medicine*
- Fax machines, VCR's and televisions
- Fuel oil/Gasoline/Gasoline and Oil Mixes
- Herbicides/Insecticides/Fungicides/Pesticides
- Kerosene
- Medical Waste (sharp items in containers only)
- Mercury items and mercury-contaminated debris
- Oil based Paints/Stains**
- Primers/Turpentine/Varnishes
- Propane Tanks1# and 20#
- * Expired Medicine can be taken to the Northville Township Police Department at any time.
- ** Latex (water-based) paint may be disposed of on your trash collection day if prepared correctly.

Proper disposal of paint requires the lids to be removed (put in trash receptacle) and allow the paint to dry out prior to disposal. (Placing clean kitty litter in the paint speeds up the drying process.) Put open cans of treated paint beside your trash, not in your trash. Read more...

Parking

Did you know it is illegal to park on City Streets between 3 a.m. and 5 a.m. without a permit?

If you are having visitors or work done on your driveway and must park in the street overnight, call Community Dispatch at 248-349-1234 by 2 a.m. with the license plate number and street location of the vehicle to avoid a parking ticket.

City Hall has a copy of the Historic Resource Council 2017 Directory, which lists architects, contractors, suppliers and others who specialize in historic preservation, rehabilitation and adaptation of historic structures and houses. This directory will interest residents of historic homes, owners of businesses in historic buildings and others who own property or are involved in the City's Historic District. At Home

An easy way to dispose of old medications

Do you have outdated prescription or over-the-counter medications that you want to get rid of? Don't flush these medications down the toilet - it pollutes the water supply; don't throw them away because they will end up in a landfill and may be

consumed by wildlife. There is a safe and convenient way to dispose of unwanted medications. Bring your unwanted medication - no liquids, needles or injectable medication - to the secure drop box in the lobby at the Northville Township Police Department at 41600 Six Mile Road. There is no paperwork required and the bin can be accessed 24/7. When the drop box is full, collections are picked up for disposal by the Drug Enforcement Authority.

Tree permits required

A permit from the Building Department may be required prior to cutting down any tree in the City of Northville. Before cutting down any tree, you must first make application to the Building Department to determine if a permit is required. The City will be enforcing this ordinance if trees are cut down without the required permit. To avoid enforcement action, please contact the City of Northville Building Department at 248 449-9902. Tree cutting is regulated by Section 90 of the City of Northville Code.

Sewage backups

If you experience an overflow or backup of a sewage disposal system or storm water system and want to file a claim with the City, <u>please check our website for</u> details or call the Department of Public Works at 248-449-9930.

When presenting a written claim, you will be required to provide the following items:

- 1. Copies of receipts for cleaning costs, plumbing bills, or other bills.
- 2. List of the damaged items and receipts to prove the ages of your items.

 Reimbursement for the Actual Cash Value of damaged items is the maximum amount payable.
- 3. Please make an attempt to provide pictures of anything you wish to claim that was damaged due to the sewer backup.

The filing of a claim does not guarantee reimbursement.

Most homeowner's insurance will not cover sewage backups, but insurance can often be obtained as an added item. Ask your insurance provider about this option. Also, consider having a plumber install a check valve - backflow preventer - to help minimize the risk of backups and related damage.

Don't take the risk of having an unlocked gun get into the wrong hands - especially if you have young children and teenagers. Stop in at the Northville Police Department lobby to get your free gun safety lock. There are no forms to fill out and no waiting.
