IMPORTANT NEW OUTDOOR WATERING RESTRICTIONS

The City of Northville obtains its water from the City of Detroit. With over 3 million customers the Detroit Water and Sewer Department (DWSD) has had difficulties meeting water demands during peak watering times in the summer. To better assure reliable water supply from DWSD, Northville has joined many communities in the Detroit Metro area in adopting new outdoor watering restrictions.

Beginning immediately, residents with underground irrigation systems (automatic sprinkling systems) may only water their grass between the hours of 12:00 Midnight and 5:00 a.m. in the morning on odd or even days based on the address of your house. If your address ends on an even number, set your irrigation system to only water during the hours listed above on even numbered days. If your address ends with an odd number, set your irrigation system to only water during the hours listed above on odd numbered days.

For residents who do not have an automatic sprinkling system, but water their lawns and gardens manually with a hose, you may only water between the hours of 11:00 a.m. in the morning to 12:00 Midnight on odd or even days based on the address of your house.

The purpose of these restrictions is to reduce our water use during peak hours of the day when DWSD has the most difficulty in meeting domestic water demands. By following these new restrictions and limiting our use during peak watering periods, Northville is better assured of receiving the water it needs for more critical indoor use, and Northville could also qualify for water rate reductions from Detroit.

Those who ignore these new restrictions will be committing a Civil Infraction and issued a ticket. Tickets will cost you \$50 for the first offense and \$100 for repeat offenses, so please, it is very important that you follow these new restrictions.

Garage Sales

Having a garage sale this summer? City Ordinance requires a permit for the placement of signs advertising a garage sale. Signs may only be placed on private property with the consent of the property owner and cannot be placed on any property located more than 500 feet from the place of the sale. The sign is obtained from the City Clerk's office and there is no charge for the permit. No garage sale sign permit shall run for more than 3 days.

MEDICINAL DRUG COLLECTION UNIT

Those looking to get rid of unused, unwanted, or expired medications can now visit the permanent drop box located inside the lobby at the Northville Township Police Department at 41600 Six Mile Road. Proper disposal of medications has long been a difficult problem. Flushing them pollutes the water supply. Throwing them in the trash makes them an easy target, not only for thieves, but for pets and wild life and Pharmacists are not allowed to take them back once they are dispensed. Drugs can be dropped off 24/7, there is no paperwork required, just place the medications in the secure drop box.

Sidewalk

If you notice some damaged sidewalk contact the Department of Public Works at 248-449-9930 and let us know where the damaged walk is. We may originally temporarily patch the walk with cold patch material, but if the walk needs to be replaced, it will be put on a replacement list.

STORM WATER

Lawn Care

The major impact of nutrient over-enrichment is excessive growth of algae that leads to nuisance algal blooms and eutrophic conditions. Nitrogen and phosphorus are principal nutrients in stormwater. Major sources are urban landscape runoff (fertilizer, detergents), atmospheric deposition and improperly functioning septic systems. Animal waste can also be a significant source of pollution.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency estimates that 70 million pounds of pesticides are applied to lawns every year.

It has been estimated that there are 25 to 30 million acres of turf and lawn in the United States. To put this statistic in perspective, if lawns were classified as a crop, they would rank as the fifth largest in the country on the basis of area.

In many areas, soils contain enough phosphorus to grow healthy lawns without any added fertilizer.

Use fertilizer sparingly and sweep excess fertilizer off pavement onto the lawn

Pet Waste

Dog waste has been found to be a major source of fecal coliform and pathogens in many urban watersheds, due to their population, daily defecation rate, and bacteria/pathogen production.

Pets and urban wildlife can be significant sources of bacteria.

Fecal coliform levels in urban stormwater often exceed public health code standards defining safe water for swimming.

Automobile Maintenance

There are over four million registered vehicles in Southeast Michigan.

Just four quarts of oil can form an eight acre oil slick if spilled or dumped down a storm drain

Car washing contributes nutrients, metals, and hydrocarbons to our waterways. This occurs as the detergent-rich water used to wash our cars flows down the street and into storm drains.

Please wash your car on your lawn

Here are some ways residents can care for their lawns and gardens and help keep our water clean:

Go native. Select plants native to Michigan. Native plants are better able to tolerate Michigan's climate, require less fertilizer and water, and are more disease resistant. Black-eyed Susan, Coral bells, Purple coneflower, and Columbine; blueberry and raspberry bushes; Christmas, Lady, and Maidenhair ferns; Black walnut, Hickory, Douglas fir, and White pine trees. All can be found in local nurseries and greenhouses.

Water wisely. Lawns need about one inch of water per week. Water only when necessary, instead of on a fixed schedule.

Use mulch. Place a thick layer of mulch (e.g., four inches) around trees and plants. This helps retain water, reduce weeds, and minimizes the need for pesticides.

Mow high. For a healthier lawn, mow high...three inches is the rule and let grass clippings fall back on the lawn for free fertilizer.

Trash / Recycling Reminders

Put trash out by 7:00 a.m. on collection day. Place containers on the lawn and not in the street.

Trash cans are to be no larger than 32 gallon size and weigh less than 50 pounds to be picked up.

Magazines, catalogues, and glossy inserts can be tied in a bundle or placed in paper shopping bag.

Latex paint must be dried out or absorbed by solid material such as kitty litter.


